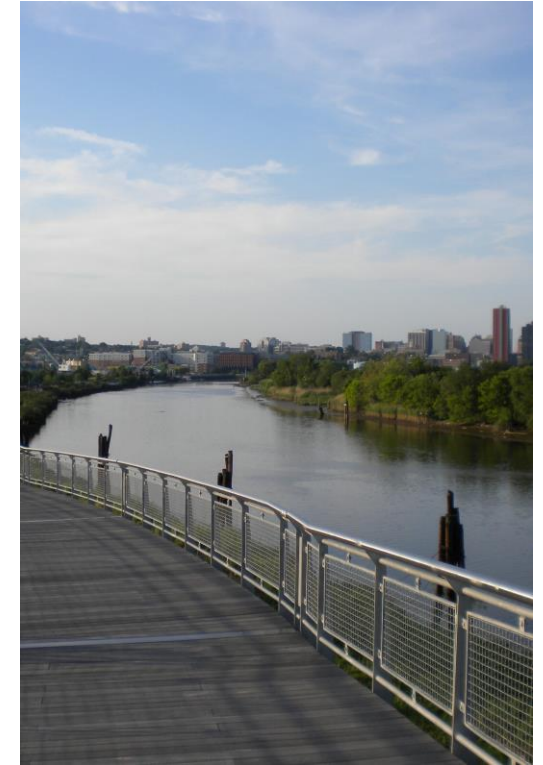

The Christina River

The Christina River flows from its headwaters west of Newark across the state to Wilmington and the Delaware River. It is part of the Christina River Basin, along with the Red and White Clay Creeks and the Brandywine Creek. Much of the watershed is developed, but New Castle County is preserving substantial streamside lands for wildlife and recreation. The Christina Riverfront, DuPont Environmental Education Center, Russel W. Peterson Urban Wildlife Refuge, and Jack A. Markell Trail are all major attractions along the Christina in Wilmington. Public boat ramps in Newport and along Churchmans Road provide recreational use of the upper reaches of the Christina. The Cooch-Dayett Mills near Newark invites visitors to learn about this magnificent river’s history.

The Christina Conservancy envisions a Christina River and watershed with clean waters and healthy natural areas to support abundant fish and wildlife and ample opportunities for recreation and enjoyment by people, thanks to the good stewardship of residents and landowners and effective regulation and management by agencies.
